GARDENING AS A HOME OCCUPATION

In Richfield:

- Community gardens are permitted as an accessory institutional use (school, church, park, etc.)
- No city code prohibits gardening/horticulture at residential property
- Selling or distributing food from a residence is prohibited (proposed amendment to clarify this)

Nearby cities have similar rules, permitting small and private gardens at residential properties without allowing sale/distribution from that property

Comparable Cities - Gardening

- Minneapolis permits community gardens as a principal use in all residential districts.
 - Permits <u>market gardens as a primary, commercial use</u>, if they are under 10,000 sq ft, and conditionally if they are over 10,000 sq ft.
 - Market garden is defined as "An establishment where food or ornamental crops are grown on the ground, on a rooftop or inside a building, to be sold or donated."
 - Community gardens are also permitted as <u>accessory uses</u>, as are CSA (community-supported agriculture) pick-up sites and farmstands (for direct sales, max 15 times/year) during the growing season.
- St Louis Park lists "Gardening and other horticultural uses" as a permitted accessory use. Does not permit selling goods out of the home, allows indoor home occupations only.
- Bloomington, prohibits all commercial agriculture (except bees and indoor agriculture). Tiny community gardens that are limited to a maximum of 3 families are permitted if 30+ feet from residential property.

Comparable Cities - Gardening

- Edina permits garden structures ("Greenhouses, garden houses") as accessory uses but does not permit selling produce directly from your home.
- Eagan allows gardening as an accessory use, outside of the Agricultural district.
 - The sale of produce is not allowed on the premises.
 - Home occupations cannot be in any accessory building, evidence cannot be visible from the street, no over-the-counter sales. (Section 11.70, Subd. 23)
 - (You might be able to have horses in your backyard and the City allows limited goat grazing!)
- Hopkins prohibits home occupations but permits "Gardening and other horticultural uses" as <u>accessory</u>.

Summary of Proposed Changes to allow Gardening as a Home Occupation

- Clarify that agricultural or beekeeping activities are exempt from the fully-enclosed building rule, provided that they are maintained and that waste is appropriately disposed of.
- Prohibit the sale of produce from the home with addition of Subd.11, item j, following the rule about prohibition of the sale of honey from the home (Subd. 11, item i)
- No changes to rules allowing community gardens at properties with institutional uses (school, church, park).
- Distribution of produce allowed at properties with institutional uses (school, church, park), but not from the home
